INTRODUCTION

This manual has been prepared by the Pennsylvania Base Development Committee to provide general information on the eleven military installations and other military organizations within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is designed to assist key individuals throughout all levels of government and the private sector within the Commonwealth in enhancing and promoting the 71,000+ active, reserve, National Guard and Department of Defense positions within the Commonwealth.

The Commonwealth has undergone Base Realignment and Closure processes in 1988, 1991, 1993, 1995 and 2005. During these rounds the Commonwealth lost 4,607 military positions and 14,292 civilian positions. All were considered to be good paying and recession proof positions. The financial impact of the loss of these positions does not include the indirect and induced positions within the local communities.

The charter of the Pennsylvania Base Development Committee is fivefold: First, to enhance the military value at all installations and organizations located within the Commonwealth; Second, to enhance the military value of all positions associated with those installations and organizations; Third, to assist with the expansion of economic development opportunities and defense related industry clusters within the Commonwealth; Fourth, to welcome all new federally-related missions, organizations and operations to the Commonwealth; Fifth, to be the best possible host for all military organizations, the military and civilian personnel and their family members. The committee's intent is to both enhance and promote the military in Pennsylvania into the future.

The Commonwealth is in a very unique position. It is not the garrison for an Active Army Division, or the homeport for a Navy Carrier battle Group, or the home base for a multi-faceted Air Force Wing. Instead, all active military installations with the Commonwealth are depots, logistics centers and one educational institution. In addition, there are Reserve Centers and numerous National Guard facilities located throughout Pennsylvania.

There are 15 sections in this manual. Each section contains general information on each of the Active, Reserve and National Guard installations and organizations with the Commonwealth. Section 15 is divided into 8 sub-sections which contain Army Corps of Engineers, Charles E. Kelly Support Facility, Military Entrance Processing Stations, Naval Operational Support Centers, Marine Corps Reserve Units, Air Force ROTC Units, Army ROTC units, Navy ROTC Units. 

Defense Logistics Agency System Integration Office, Material Management Directorate (DLA-SIO) Acts as the primary advisor to DLA Headquarters for all issues related to the management of assigned supply chain systems and the DLA Business System Modernization (BSM) initiatives. Provides oversight of the execution of information technology solutions for assigned supply chain management and distributed systems supporting the DLA mission.

Fleet and Industrial Supply Center Norfolk Detachment (FISC) The Fleet and Industrial Supply Center (FISC) Norfolk Detachment Philadelphia mission is to support operations by providing quality logistics support focusing on the unique needs of each of our customers.

Document Automation & Printing Service - Philadelphia (DAPS) The Document Automation & Production Service is responsible for document automation and printing within the Department of Defense and the Federal Executive Branch Agencies, encompassing electronic conversion, retrieval, output and distribution of digital and hardcopy information.

U.S. Navy Recruiting District Philadelphia (NRD) Manages the recruitment and processing of men and women for enlistment in the Navy and Naval Reserve.

U.S. Army Recruiting Battalion, Mid-Atlantic (USARB, MA) The U.S. Army North Philadelphia Recruiting Company will, provide strength to the Army, with integrity and honesty; maintain a high quality of life for the assigned soldiers and families; expand and develop relationships with community high schools, colleges/universities and centers of influence.

MAJOR CHANGES TO INSTALLATION OR COMMAND RESULTING FROM PREVIOUS BRAC **ACTIVITIES:**

BRAC 91: Move of Fleet and Industrial Supply Center Norfolk Det. (FISC) from Philadelphia Naval Shipyard to the Naval Support Activity in Northeast Philadelphia.

BRAC 91: Move of Office of Naval Research Manufacturing Technology Detachment (ONR-Mantech) from Philadelphia Naval Shipyard to the Naval Support Activity in Northeast Philadelphia.

BRAC 91: Move of SPAWAR Systems Center San Diego, C4I Program Office (SSCSD-C4I) from Philadelphia Naval Shipyard to the Naval Support Activity in Northeast Philadelphia.

BRAC 93: Defense Personnel Supply Center (DPSC) and tenant activities move approximately 3,700 people (Defense Contract Management (DCM), Defense Contract Management Agency -Industrial Analysis Support Center (DCMA-IASC), Defense Logistics Agency System Integration Office, Material Mgmt Directorate (DLA-SIO), Department of Defense Inspector General (DODIG), Soldier Biological and Chemical Directorate (SBC), U.S. Air Force Clothing and Textile (AFCTO), Navy Clothing and Textile Research Facility (NCTRF), DLA Product Testing Center (PTC), and U.S. Marine Corps Liaison Office (MCLO) was moved from the Defense Personnel Support Center at 20th Street and Oregon Avenue to the Naval Support Activity in Northeast Philadelphia.

BRAC 95: Consolidated the Defense Industrial Support Center and the Defense Personnel Supply Center into the Defense Personnel Support Center. This facility is located at the Naval Support Activity in Northeast Philadelphia.

BRAC 2005: Consolidated the Human Resources Center Northeast, Human Resources Center Southeast and the Civil Personnel Office and relocated them to NSA Philadelphia. The BRAC Commission also approved the recommendation to realign the Navy Philadelphia Business Center, PA, by relocating the Norfolk Naval Shipyard Detachment, Naval Sea Systems Command Shipbuilding Support Office ship repair function to Norfolk Naval Shipyard, VA. The movement of the Human Resources Center from Center Philadelphia will add 180 positions to the installation.

DIRECTIONS TO THE INSTALLATION:

From I-95 South, exit at 73 (Cottman Avenue) then left on US 1 (Roosevelt Boulevard). Use outer three lanes. Go right onto Levick Street then left onto Oxford Avenue. Naval Support Activity compound is 1/2 block on right.

From I-95 North, exit at Bridge Street. Merge onto Harbison Avenue then left on Levick Street to Oxford Avenue. Make left on Oxford Avenue. Naval Support Activity compound is 1/2 block on right.

From 276 West, take exit 28 (US1). Follow US1 South (Roosevelt Boulevard). Go right on Levick Street then left onto Oxford Avenue. Naval Support Activity compound is 1/2 block on right.

From 76 East, take exit 24 (Valley Forge Interchange). Follow 76 (Schuylkill Expressway) to US 1 North (Roosevelt Boulevard). Go left onto Adams Avenue, then right onto Tabor Avenue. Go right on Levick then right on Oxford Avenue. Naval Support Activity is straight ahead.

Captain Vitt is presently assigned as Commanding Officer, Naval Support Activity Mechanicsburg/Philadelphia, PA. He is responsible for three naval installations in Pennsylvania - Mechanicsburg, Northeast Philadelphia and the former Philadelphia Naval Shipyard - which collectively support 78 tenant commands with over 11,000 military, civil service and contractor personnel. Commander Adams graduated from The Citadel in 1983 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in History and was commissioned through the Naval Reserve Officer Training Program. His first assignment was as Electronic Material Officer and Anti-Submarine Warfare Officer in USS W.S. Sims (FF-1059) homeported in Mayport, Florida. A subsequent sea tour included serving as Weapons Officer in USS Joseph Hewes (FF-1078) initially homeported in Charleston, South Carolina and later in Ingleside, Texas.

Commander Adams served ashore as an Operational Test Director on the staff of Commander, Operational Test and Evaluation Force. He was responsible for operational testing of surface ship anti-submarine warfare systems.

In 1990, Commander Adams graduated from Old Dominion University with a Master of Science degree in Educational Administration. He was then awarded the Education and Training Management Subspecialty code.

From 1994-2001, Commander Adams served as a drilling reservist. His reserve assignments included Commanding Officer of NR Samuel Gompers Det 510, Operations Officer for Fleet Hospital 21, Commanding Officer of NR SIMA Pascagoula Det 1, and as a Training Officer with Commander, Seventh Fleet Det 111. His civilian occupation was a middle school teacher and assistant principal in Houston, Texas.

In 2000, Commander Adams was recalled to active duty for six months to serve as a Battle Watch Captain for Commander, Second Fleet. Brigadier General Gustave F. Perna is the Commander of the Defense Supply Center Philadelphia, Defense Logistics Agency. DSCP annually buys over \$12.4 billion worth of food, clothing, textiles, medicines, medical supplies, construction and equipment items for America's warfighters and other customers worldwide.

Prior to assuming command at DSCP, Brigadier General Perna served as the Executive Officer to the Director of DLA, Fort Belvoir, Virginia. In this capacity, he directly supported the Director's mission of providing the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and other federal agencies with logistics, acquisitions and technical services support.

As an Infantry Officer, Brigadier General Perna served in the 1st Battalion, 27th Infantry as a Rifle Platoon Leader, Rifle Company Executive Officer and Battalion S4 at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii. He then transferred to the Ordnance Corps and served as the Wheel Vehicle Branch and Division Chief, commanded B Company, 143d Ordnance Battalion, and served as Aide de Camp to the Chief of the Ordnance Corps, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland.

Brigadier General Perna's next assignment led him to the 13th Corps Support Command, Fort Hood, Texas where he deployed immediately to Somalia as a staff member of the Joint Task Force Support Command. Upon return to Fort Hood, he was assigned to the COSCOM G4 staff as the Maintenance Officer and completed his tour serving as the 544th Maintenance Battalion Support Operations Officer and Battalion Executive Officer. Brigadier General Perna returned to overseas duty in Saudi Arabia as the Eastern Region Logistics Advisor.

Upon his second return to Fort Hood, he was assigned to the 1st Cavalry Division as the DISCOM Executive Officer and later the Division G4 while the unit deployed to Bosnia. Brigadier General Perna completed that tour as the Deputy Commanding Officer for the 64th Corps Support Group. Brigadier General Perna then commanded the 64th Forward Support Battalion, 3rd Brigade, 4th Infantry Division at Fort Carson, Colorado; he deployed the battalion to combat operations during OIF I. Following battalion command, he served as the Ordnance Branch Chief, Human Resources Command. Brigadier General Perna then served as the Commander of the 4th Sustainment Brigade; he deployed the brigade to combat operations during OIF 05-07.





Naval Surface Warfare Center, Carderock Division, Ship Systems Engineering Station (NSWCCD-SSES) serves as the Navy's principal Test and Evaluation Center and In-Service Engineering Agent for all Hull, Mechanical and Electrical (HM&E) ship systems and equipments and is the Research and Development Center for all Navy machinery.

Center for Naval Engineering Detachment Philadelphia supports the training of engineering personnel being assigned to new construction AEGIS destroyers.

Federal Employees Compensation Act, Norfolk (FECA) processes claims for injured government employees applying for benefits.

Naval Criminal Investigative Service (NCIS) investigates crimes committed on Navy property and provides counter-intelligence services.

Naval Inactive Ship Maintenance Facility (NISMO) Inactivates, stores, removes parts and components from inactive ships for reutilization and prepares for disposal Navy non-nuclear ships assigned.

Naval Medical Clinic (NAVMEDCLIN) provides basic medical aid to installation commands and provides occupational health and OSHA-mandated screening services to those activities.

Naval Foundry and Propeller Center, Detachment, Philadelphia (NFPC) the largest public-owned foundry and propeller shop, provides a single facility within the naval establishment for marketing, designing, engineering, manufacturing and repairing propellers for all types of surface and subsurface craft of the U.S. Navy and its customers.

NAVFAC Mid-Atlantic PA/NJ IPT provides transportation services and maintenance and repair of buildings, roads and utilities for Navy installations in Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

Facilities Engineering Acquisitions Department (FEAD) supervises and inspects construction contracts in Pennsylvania and Delaware.

United States Coast Guard Field Investigation Support Team (FIST) is to satisfy intelligence requirements through collection and reporting of intelligence, liaison with collection personnel of other agencies, and to provide situational awareness and warning of tactical events. FIST activities support the Coast Guard, departmental and national objectives.

MAJOR CHANGES TO INSTALLATION OR COMMAND RESULTING FROM PREVIOUS BRAC ACTIVITIES:

Pre-BRAC-91 the base (League Island Naval Complex) included the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard, Naval Station Philadelphia and 30+ tenant activities. At that time there were approximately 20,000+ military and civilian personnel at the complex (not including military aboard ships in for repair).

BRAC-91 closed the Naval Station and the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard, leaving the Naval Surface Warfare Center, Carderock Division, Ship Systems Engineering Station (NSWCCD-SSES); the Foundry and Propeller Center (NFPC); the Naval Inactive Ships Maintenance Facility Detachment (NISMF); and several small support detachments (FISC, PWC, etc,) as active commands. The property of PNSY inside the Controlled Industrial Area (CIA) was to be "preserved" while the remainder of the complex not occupied by NSWCCD-SSES, NFPC, NISMF, or the small support detachments was to be excessed and turned over to the City of Philadelphia through the Philadelphia Industrial Authority for Development (PAID).

BRAC–95 eliminated the majority of the CIA and closed NSWCCD Annapolis, transferring approximately 280 positions and \$100M in facilities of Machinery Research and Development from Annapolis to NSWCCD Philadelphia.

Post BRAC-95 Following the shutdown to the Naval Station Philadelphia and the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard, NSWCCD-SSES (also known as NAVSSES) became the host activity for the remaining Navy/Federal activities at the "Naval Base". Closure ceremonies for NAVSTA Philadelphia were held in September 1995, and the closure ceremony for PNSY was held at the end of September 1996. During the interim, between the shutdown in early 1995 and the actual closure, approximately 200 PNSY employees closed up buildings and environmentally cleaned up property to be excessed/turned over to the City of Philadelphia (PAID). On 30 March 2000, the Philadelphia Authority for Industrial Development (PAID) signed the deed on behalf of the City of Philadelphia for all non-Navy-retained property at the League Island Complex – now the Philadelphia Naval Business Center, which was placed under the control of the Philadelphia Industrial Development Corporation for development as a privately owned industrial park. Portions of that property were, in turn, sold to private civilian industries, i.e. Aker Philadelphia Shipyard.

Post 1 October 2003 Commander Naval Installation (CNI), Mid-Atlantic Region assumed control and maintenance responsibility for all Navy-retained property, buildings, and roads. This removed the Host Activity responsibilities from NSWCCD-SSES.





Captain David Opatz, USN NAS JRB Installation Commanding Officer

Captain Opatz is a native of So. St. Paul, Minnesota. He graduated from the United States Naval Academy in 1986 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Science.

During a three-year tour aboard USS Raleigh (LPD-1), Captain Opatz deployed to the North Atlantic (participating in Exercise Northern Wedding), Mediterranean Sea, and an emergent Arabian Gulf deployment in support of U.S. Mine-Sweeping operations. He

served as the Boat Division Officer, 2nd Division Officer and Navigator/Personnel Officer, completing Surface Warfare qualifications.

Captain Opatz transitioned from Surface Warfare to Naval Aviation, and in December 1990, graduated as a Naval Flight Officer (NFO) from Training Squadron TEN (VT-10). He continued aviation training at E-2C Hawkeye Fleet Replacement Squadron (FRS) VAW-120 and received his NFO "Wings of Gold".

In November 1991, Captain Opatz joined the "Tigertails" of Airborne Early Warning Squadron ONE TWO FIVE (VAW-125) assigned aboard USS Saratoga (CV-60). Deployed twice to Mediterranean Sea, he participated in Operations Deny Flight/Provide Promise, Bosnia, and NATO Exercise Dynamic Impact. He achieved the CICO designation in eleven months, stood Anti-Surface (ASUW) and Air Resource Coordinator (AREC) watches; and in 1994, earned the coveted COMAEWWINGLANT "Hawkeye of the Year-at Sea" award.

Captain Opatz joined the "Greyhawks" of VAW-120 as an NFO Instructor and NATOPS Evaluator. While assigned to the Greyhawks, he earned a Master's Degree in Education from Old Dominion University, Norfolk, Virginia.

In September 1997, Captain Opatz transitioned to the Navy Reserve and joined the "Nightwolves" of Airborne Early Warning Squadron SEVEN SEVEN (VAW-77) for counter drug operations in the Caribbean region. He headed the departments of Training, Operations, and Maintenance and attended the Canadian Command and Staff College.

In October 2000, Captain Opatz reported to Carrier Reserve Wing TWENTY (CVWR-20) in the assignments of Safety Officer, Assistant Operations Officer, and Acting Air Wing Operations Officer for the Inter-Fleet Transfer of USS Nimitz (CVN-68). Captain Opatz became the Officer-In-Charge of Airborne Early Warning Squadron SEVEN EIGHT (VAW-78), the "Thunder Slugs", in 2003 and participated in various missions supporting Fleet operations.

Captin Opatz returned to VAW-77 as the Executive Officer in August 2004 overseeing the transition of Group 0 to Group 2 aircraft at the same time the squadron's hardware inventory grew from four to six aircraft. During this phase of transition and added training, the squadron maintained a 100% sortie completion rate on overseas detachments.

Captain Opatz proudly assumed command of VAW-77 in May 2005. The "Nightwolves" completed five counter narco-terrorist detachments O-CONUS; was the first E-2 squadron to respond to Hurricane Katrina disaster relief; and was awarded the Aviation Safety "S" Award for Class "A" Mishap-Free Flight Hours. Upon completion of command in June 2006, Captain Opatz reported to the Industrial College of the Armed Forces (ICAF) in Washington D.C. and earned a Master of Science degree in National Resource Strategy. Captain Opatz recently completed an assignment as the Legislative Liaison to the OPNAV staff of Aviation Warfare (N88) serving in the Pentagon.

Captain Opatz has accumulated over 3200 flight hours in the E-2C and has been aircrew for over 450 carrier landings. His personal awards include the Meritorious Service medal, Air Medal-Strike Flight, Joint Commendation Medal, Navy Commendation Medal, Navy Achievement Medal and various Unit and Service awards.



Colonel Robert F. Leary, USMC

Colonel Leary was born in 1960 and raised in Brockton, Massachusetts. In May 1982, he graduated from Saint Anselm College, Manchester, New Hampshire with a Bachelors of Science in Criminal Justice. After being commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in December 1983, he completed The Basic School and reported to NAS Pensacola for flight training in August 1984; being designated a Naval Aviator in May 1986.

Returning to the United States, he resumed his flight instructor tour with HT-8.

Colonel Leary returned to HML/A-167 in November of 1993. He served as the Flight Line Division Officer, Assistant Maintenance Officer and Maintenance Officer. During this period, he also completed two LF6F deployments. He attached to HMM-266 (Rein) serving as the Quality Assurance Division Officer and participated in Operation Quickdraw, Somalia. As well, he participated in Balkan operations with HMM-264 (Rein) serving as the Assistant Maintenance Officer.

In July of 1996, Colonel Leary was assigned to the Office of Naval Intelligence and served as the Marine Liaison Officer and the Foreign Rotary-wing Intelligence Analyst. After completing this tour in 1999, he once again returned to HML/A-167 where he served as the Executive Officer. In May of 2001, Colonel Leary was reassigned and served as the Operations Officer for MAG-26 until his assignment to Johnstown, Pennsylvania as Site Commander.

HMLA-775 mobilized and deployed in support of OIF II in 2004, Colonel Leary deployed with the unit and was assigned to MAG-16 in theater. Returning to CONUS, he attended the Army War College and received a Masters Degree in Strategic Studies. In 2005, Colonel Leary was then transferred to Peterson AFB, Colorado and served as Deputy Director J5 Plans and Policy and Deputy Chief of Staff, Headquarters, North American Aerospace Defense Command and United States Northern Command.





MAJOR CHANGES TO INSTALLATION OR COMMAND RESULTING FROM PREVIOUS BRAC ACTIVITIES:

1995:

Tobyhanna has gained new missions and workload in each of five BRAC rounds. In BRAC-95, McClellan AFB in California closed and the ground communications-electronics maintenance mission performed there at the Sacramento Air Logistics Center was transferred to Tobyhanna. The three-year transition of capability on 161 systems was completed in September 2000. BRAC 95 also directed the realignment of Letterkenny Army Depot and the transfer of its missile guidance and control system repair workload on three tactical missile systems to Tobyhanna. This workload transfer was completed in July 2001.

As a result of BRAC 95 workload transitions, Tobyhanna Army Depot converted 125,000 sq. ft. of warehouse space into high-tech production facilities and added more than 7,000 sq. ft. of new facilities.

2005:

The depot is scheduled to gain workload from the Naval Weapons Station Seal Beach and the Marine Corps Logistics Base Barstow, both in California, as a result of BRAC 2005 recommendations. Once all of the missions have been adjusted, it is anticipated that there will be an additional 71 personnel added to the existing workforce.

LTC Talley is accompanied in command by his wife of 24 years, the former Lori Johnson of Washington, DC.




FRANCIS SEAN FLYNN



PENNSYLVANIA ARMY AND AIR NATIONAL GUARD

PRIMARY AND TENANT ORGANIZATIONS MISSION STATEMENTS AT FORT INDIANTOWN GAP:

Joint Force Headquarters: Provides command and control for the Pennsylvania Army and Air National Guard as well as the Bureau of Veterans Affairs and Scotland School for Veterans' Children.

Fort Indiantown Gap: Provides military training for active and Reserve components of all military services. Civilian organizations are accommodated whenever possible. More than 860,000 training mandays (active, Reserve & National Guard), multi-service personnel, civilians and foreign nationals are executed on the installation annually.

Northeast Counterdrug Training Center: Provides Drug Law Enforcement and Demand Reduction agencies, within the northeastern United States, a no-cost training center. This training center provides all necessary facilities, instruction and support to enhance the capabilities to reduce and remove illegal drugs from our streets and educate our communities in the most up-to-date prevention techniques.

Eastern Aviation Training Site: Conducts aviator and aircrew training in attack, cargo and utility helicopters to include: UH-60 Blackhawk, UH-1H Huey, CH-47D Chinook, AH-64 Apache and the UH-72 Lakota for U.S. and foreign military personnel. The Lakota is the newest helicopter in the Army and the EAATS was designated as *the* training facility for this system. In addition to the aircraft training, EAATS personnel operate flight simulators in all systems listed above.

Headquarters, 166th Regiment (Combat Arms): Provides regionalized combat arms individual training, including Military Occupational Specialty Qualification, Additional Skill Identifier, Non-Commissioned Officer Education System and Officer Education System (Officer Candidate School) training for the Army National Guard, the United States Army Reserve and the active Army. Provides management and quality assurance oversight for the functionally aligned Total Army School System (TASS) Battalions within the region and monitors and coordinates academic instruction, food and lodging (where available) for soldiers participating in courses at its training sites.

Regional Training Site - Maintenance: Provides Career Management Field 63MOS qualification, NCOES and ASI - H8 (Recovery) training or other maintenance training or New Equipment Training as directed during peacetime, enabling the U.S. Army to mobilize and deploy USAR components, National Guard and active Army maintenance soldiers capable of supporting current and force modernization systems.

Regional Training Site - Medical: Provides training, training support and validation of mission essential tasks performed by military medical elements. Priority is to Army National Guard medical companies, evacuation assets and combat lifesavers, in the conduct of humanitarian and wartime. Its mission also includes conducting mobile training team assistance and/or assessment visits to units scheduled to train at MCTS.

Lightning Force Academy: Dedicated to the engineering and installations war fighters who deploy and perform the communications networks installations that aid in the successful total force operation in any theater of operation. It is the only schoolhouse of this type in the military. Courses taught at the LFA include: Electronics, Cable/Antenna Standard Installation Practices, Combat Tactics, Fiber Optics, Local Area Network, Team Chief Academy, Project Engineering, Computer Assisted Drafting & Design, Quality Assurance, Team Chief Refresher and Confined Space Entry.

Regional Equipment Operators Training Site: This is a one-of-a-kind schoolhouse provides proficiency training and enhanced war skills training certification for all civil engineer construction trades. The school places emphasis on bare-base-bed down operations, but also provides training for air base operability mission requirements. REOTS trains equipment operators on four main pieces of airfield damage repair construction equipment: the grader, bulldozer, excavator, and 4CY front-end loader.

Air-To-Ground Bomb Range: Provides an environment for military organizations to conduct live tactical training that includes air-to-ground weapons delivery and tactics, Close Air Support, Joint Attack, and Aerial Re-supply training. Services provided: Day and night bomb and strafe scoring, Battlefield Maneuvering Tactics, Electronic Threat Emission, Surface to Air Missile Identification, Forward Area Controller, Close Air Support, Laser Designation, Rocket Marking and Airdrop Training and Recovery. They also conduct Coordinated Fire, Joint Air Tactics (JAT), and Combat Search And Rescue (CSAR) Training during daylight operations.

U.S. Army Health Clinic: Provides outpatient health care to Fort Indiantown Gap's active duty personnel and their families and Occupational Health Surveillance to the civilian workforce.

Equipment Concentration Site - 24: Receives, stores, and issues U.S. Army Reserve equipment and performs operator and organizational maintenance for all equipment assigned to the base USAR or ROTC units.

U.S. Army and Air Force Exchange System: Provides merchandise, services and military apparel to authorized patrons at uniformly low process and generate reasonable earnings in support of moral, welfare and recreation activities.

Pennsylvania State Police, Physical Fitness Center: In charge of the physical fitness testing for the entire Pennsylvania State Police force, from entry-level to senior officers, by using existing sports facilities at Fort Indiantown Gap.

Training Aid Support Center: Responsible for providing a wide assortment of training materials from creation to final product in support of various schools located at Fort Indiantown Gap.

365th Engineer Battalion: Provides training for heavy equipment operators for horizontal construction. The battalion could deploy overseas if required.

Defense Security Service: Handles background, personnel security investigations for the military (Guard and Reserve), civilians and industrial positions at military bases. The location and cost savings are main reasons for establishing an office at Fort Indiantown Gap.

Direct/General Support Maintenance (DS/GS): Provides DS/GS maintenance support to the 99th Reserve Readiness Center (RRC) and the active Army 15th Training Support Battalion, New Cumberland, the Marine Corps Reserve in Pennsylvania and various other active military organizations, along with mobilization and demobilization missions as assigned.

Pennsylvania National Guard Military Museum: Preserves and honors the history of all units of the Pennsylvania Army and Air National Guard from the Civil War to the present with special emphasis on the 20th century, interpreting for citizens, veterans and young people the story of "The Guard" and Fort Indiantown Gap.

Civil Air Patrol, Pennsylvania Wing: The three primary missions of the CAP are cadet programs, emergency services and aerospace education to more than 61,000 cadet and senior members nationwide.

AMVETS: Provides free counseling and claims assistance for honorably discharged veterans and dependents. The organization also advocates initiatives to secure earned benefits and services for veterans and community services that help families, neighbors and the nation at large.

Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (Eastern School): The open areas of Fort Indiantown Gap provide a safe environment to train PennDOT truck and heavy equipment operators to safely operate and prepare individuals for required certification.

This transition reduced overhead and duplication and streamlined operations at the installation. Some 350 active Army and Army civilian positions were terminated.

- Go straight through that light for approximately 3 tenths of a mile and make a right on Wiley Rd. (Just past the 28th Infantry Division Memorial and before you get to the C-130 airplane monument.)
- Go 200 yards and make a right on Broad St. which will bring you to the Security Check Point for the headquarters parking lot.

MAJOR GENERAL JESSICA L. WRIGHT THE ADJUTANT GENERAL PENNSYLVANIA NATIONAL GUARD

Major General Jessica L. Wright was named the 50th adjutant general and commander of the Pennsylvania National Guard Feb. 3, 2004, and sworn in by Gov. Edward G. Rendell March 5, 2004. In this cabinet position, she is responsible for command, control and supervision of all Air and Army National Guard units allocated to the state of Pennsylvania, six state-owned veterans' homes, Scotland School for Veterans' Children and programs for Pennsylvania's 1.1 million veterans. Prior to this assignment, she served as the acting adjutant general, a post she assumed Jan. 2, 2004; and prior to that, deputy adjutant general – Army, Pennsylvania Army National Guard since May 1, 2000.

Gen. Wright was born in Monessen, Pa. She began her military career as an enlistee in the Pennsylvania Army National Guard in 1975, after graduating from Alderson Broaddus College with a bachelor's degree in social work. Gen. Wright also holds a master's degree in management from Webster University, St. Louis, Mo., and an honorary doctorate degree in public service. After completion of the Information Specialist Course at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind., she attended the Women's Army Corps Officer Orientation/Officer Candidate School at Fort McClellan, Ala., and the Adjutant General Basic Course at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind. In 1978, she attended the Officers Rotary Wing Aviator Course at Fort Rucker, Ala., and became the first female Army aviator in the Army National Guard. In addition, she is a graduate of the CH-47 Aviator Qualification Course, CH-54 Aviator Qualification Course, Medical Service Corps Officer Advanced Course, Command and General Staff College, Army Management Staff College and Army War College Military Fellowship at the Center for Strategic and International Studies, Washington, D.C.

Gen. Wright began her service as a member of Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Pennsylvania Army National Guard in 1975. Upon completion of flight school, she joined the 228th Aviation Company as a UH-1 and CH-47 pilot and was later appointed as the adjutant of the 28th Aviation Battalion. In 1982, she joined the 1028th Transportation Company (Heavy Helicopter) as the flight operations platoon commander, and in 1983, joined the Eastern Army National Guard Aviation Training Site, where she served as the assistant operations and training officer and flight operations officer. After transferring to the Georgia Army National Guard in 1985, she joined the 1160th Transportation Company (Heavy Helicopter) where she served as the flight operations platoon commander.

Gen. Wright joined the Title 10 Active Guard and Reserve program in 1986 and was assigned as an assistant professor of military science at Georgia Southern College, Statesboro, Ga. In 1989, she was reassigned to Headquarters, National Guard Bureau, where she served as a personnel staff officer; executive officer and chief of the budget and services branch; chief of the tours management office, Army National Guard Personnel Directorate; and chief, personnel service division, Army National Guard Personnel Directorate.

Gen. Wright served as commander, 28th Aviation Brigade, 28th Infantry Division (Mechanized) based at Fort Indiantown Gap from June 1997 to November 1998. She was the first female maneuver brigade commander in the Army. Prior to her assuming the deputy adjutant general – Army position, Gen. Wright served as the state Army aviation officer. She was promoted to her current rank March 5, 2004.

Gen. Wright's awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit with oak leaf cluster, Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Army Achievement Medal, Army Reserve Component Achievement Medal, National Defense Service Medal, and Armed Forces Reserve Medal. Additionally, she is a senior Army aviator and is a recipient of the Army Staff Identification Badge, the Order of St. Michael, the Order of St. Joan de Arc and the ATHENA Award. She is a former member of the ATHENA Foundation board of directors.


Major General Stephen M. Sischo is the deputy adjutant general-Air for the Pennsylvania National Guard, headquarters at Fort Indiantown Gap, Annville, Pa. Gen. Sischo joined the Connecticut Air National Guard in 1996, and moved to Pennsylvania in 1997. He led contingency deployments to Southwest Asia in 1999, and again, in 2001, providing A-10 combat support for Operation Southern Watch.

Gen. Sischo has completed Air Command and Staff College and Air War College. His military decorations include: the Legion of Merit, Air Force Meritorious Service Medal with two devices, the Aerial Achievement Medal, the Air Force Commendation Medal with one device, the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award and the Combat Readiness Medal. He is a command pilot with more than 4,000 flying hours.

Gen. Sischo has served as commander of the 111th Fighter Wing, Joint Reserve Base, Willow Grove, and commander of the 193rd Special Operations Wing, Harrisburg International Airport. He assumed his current position in November 2006.

Brigadier General Joseph G. De Paul is the Deputy Adjutant General – Army, and the Deputy Commanding General, 28th Infantry Division, Pennsylvania Army National Guard. As the Deputy Adjutant General, a post he assumed on August 13, 2007, General De Paul is responsible for the oversight of the Pennsylvania Army National Guard, its 15,000 soldiers and facilities in over 100 communities throughout the Commonwealth. In his capacity as Deputy Commanding General, which he assumed responsibility for in October 2006, he oversees the operations, readiness and training of three combat maneuver brigades and an aviation brigade. General De Paul has served in each of the three major components of the Pennsylvania Army National Guard: the Pennsylvania National Guard Joint Headquarters, the 28th Infantry Division, and the 213th Area Support Group.

General De Paul was born in Philadelphia, Pa. He graduated from North Penn High School, Lansdale, Pa., in 1969. He graduated from Regents College, State University of New York, with a bachelor's degree in sociology in 1989. General De Paul graduated from the Pennsylvania National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School, Fort Indiantown Gap in 1978. His military education includes the Transportation Officer Basic Course, Transportation Officer Advanced Course and Combined Arms Services Staff School. He is also a graduate of the Command and General Staff College and the Associate Logistics Executive Development Course. He is a graduate of the United States Army War College, Class of 2002 with a master's degree in Strategic Studies.

General De Paul's career as a Guardsman began December 13, 1970, when he enlisted in the Headquarters, 56th Brigade in Philadelphia. He served in a variety of enlisted assignments and attained the rank of staff sergeant before entering Officer Candidate School. General De Paul received his commission March 21, 1979, and was initially assigned as the assistant operations officer for the 154th Transportation Battalion with other assignments of increasing responsibility to include commanding Headquarters, and Headquarters Detachment culminating as the Battalion S3 in 1987. In 1988, General De Paul served with the United States Army Reserve in Wisconsin. After a brief assignment as an instructor for the Officer Advanced Course, he was selected to command HHC, 84th Division (Training) in Milwaukee, Wis. He returned to the Pennsylvania Army National Guard and the 154th Transportation Battalion in October of 1990 as the battalion operations officer.

In 1991, he was selected as the battalion executive officer and acting battalion commander until 1993 when he was transferred to the Directorate of Personnel, Headquarters, State Area Command. In the Directorate of Personnel, he served as a personnel staff officer, and later assumed the duties of officer personnel division chief. During his tenure as commander of the 328th Forward Support Battalion, from May 1, 1997, through July 01, 2000, General De Paul had four successful annual training periods, to include a deployment to Nicaragua in 1999 in support of Operation New Horizon. In July 2000, General De Paul transferred to the Director of Logistics to serve as chief, maintenance division.

General De Paul's military awards and decorations include: Meritorious Service Medal with four oak leaf clusters; Army Commendation Medal with three oak leaf clusters; Army Achievement Medal; Army Reserve Component Achievement Medal with seven oak leaf clusters; National Defense Service Medal with bronze service star; Humanitarian Service Medal with bronze service star; Armed Forces Reserve Medal with gold hour glass device; Army Service Ribbon; Overseas Training Ribbon with numeral five; Pennsylvania Meritorious Service Medal; Pennsylvania Commendation Medal with two silver stars; Pennsylvania Service Ribbon with six silver stars; Pennsylvania Twenty Year Service Medal with two silver stars; MG Thomas R. White Ribbon; and the General T.J. Stewart Medal. General De Paul was the first recipient of the Lieutenant General Milton J. Baker Award in 1978.

General De Paul is a member of the National Guard Association of the United States, the Military Officer Association of America, the Association of the United States Army and a member of American Legion Post 559, Annville, Pa. He was very active in the Pennsylvania JAYCEES and served in a variety of leadership positions in the mid-eighties. He was a charter member of the GWYN-NOR JAYCEES and served as its first president. General De Paul is a member of Walmer's Lutheran Church in Jonestown, Pa.

General De Paul serves full-time in the Pennsylvania Department of Military and Veterans Affairs. He has served in a variety of assignments of increasing responsibility over the past 37 years. At unit level, he served as an administrative supply technician; at battalion, he served as a training technician and administrative officer; at Joint Force Headquarters, he served as a personnel specialist, state family coordinator, plans/actions branch chief, military personnel officer, training administrator and technician program manager as Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations before assuming his present position as Deputy Adjutant General and Deputy Commanding General, 28th Infantry Division. General De Paul served for several years in civilian industry as a Capacity Development Manager for TRAN-STAR, a refrigerated transportation carrier based in Wapaca, Wisconsin. General De Paul was promoted to his present rank September 30, 2007.

COLONEL WALTER T. LORD CHIEF OF STAFF

Colonel Walt Lord was assigned as Chief of Staff, Joint Headquarters, Pennsylvania National Guard on May 1, 2006. In this position, he provides oversight and coordination of all staff and command actions at the Joint Headquarters, as well as serving as liaison between the Pennsylvania Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, the Governor's Office and other state and federal agencies. Prior to his assignment as the Chief of Staff, COL Lord was the Assistant Chief of Staff G3 (Chief of Operations, Plans and Training) for the 28th Infantry Division. As such, he was responsible for all matters pertaining to current operations, future plans, training, force structure, and mobilization for a National Guard Division consisting of more than 13,000 soldiers.

He enlisted in the 2nd Battalion, 111th Infantry in 1982 at the age of 17. In 1990 COL Lord entered active duty through the Active Guard & Reserve (AGR) program.

COL Lord's stateside AGR assignments include: Assistant Professor of Military Science (Army ROTC) at Indiana University of Pennsylvania; concurrent assignment as Commander, Headquarters Company, 56th Brigade, 28th ID and Assistant Chief of Staff,





BRIGADIER GENERAL JERRY G. BECK JR. 28th DIVISION COMMANDER

Brigadier General Jerry G. Beck Jr. is the Commanding General, 28th Infantry Division (Mechanized), Pennsylvania Army National Guard, an organization of over 15,000 soldiers headquartered in Harrisburg, Pa. He was promoted to his current position in October 2006 and his current rank in March 2003. In this position, he commands a National Guard mechanized infantry division, consisting of five major subordinate commands and 23 battalions, all stationed in 95 communities in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Virginia.

Gen. Beck began his military career in the Pennsylvania Army National Guard in 1977, as a private serving as a personnel management specialist for Headquarters Company, 2nd Battalion, 111th Infantry in Phoenixville, Pa. He received his commission as a second lieutenant from the Officer Candidate School of the Pennsylvania National Guard Military Academy in 1979, and served for one year as a tactical officer at the academy. Following this assignment, Gen. Beck served as a rifle platoon leader in Company B, 1st Battalion, 111th Infantry, Philadelphia. He also served as a mortar platoon leader in Company B before being assigned as company commander of Company A, 1st Battalion, 111th Infantry, Philadelphia, in 1982. After his tenure as company commander, Gen. Beck was assigned as the assistant battalion operations officer (S-3) and later the battalion logistics officer (S-4) of the 1st Battalion before transferring to Headquarters, 56th Brigade as the assistant brigade logistics officer (S-4). While with the 56th Brigade, Gen. Beck also served as the brigade training and operations officer (S-3), brigade intelligence officer (S-2) and brigade personnel officer (S-1). In 1994, Gen. Beck transferred to Headquarters, 28th Infantry Division where he served as the division's training and operations officer (G-3). Gen. Beck assumed command of the 1st Battalion, 111th Infantry (Mechanized) in Norristown, Pa., in 1995. Upon completing his battalion command, Gen. Beck was assigned as the deputy chief of staff for operations, Pennsylvania Army National Guard at Fort Indiantown Gap. In 1998, he was assigned as the chief of staff, Pennsylvania Army National Guard, and in 2002, deployed with the Headquarters 28th Infantry Division to Bosnia-Herzegovina where he served as the deputy commander, Multinational Brigade North (MNB-N) SFOR 12. Upon completion of that tour in 2003, Gen. Beck was selected to perform a follow-on tour as the commanding general of Multinational Brigade (East) in Kosovo. During that tour of duty he provided command and control to approximately 3,500 multinational soldiers in the U.S. sector of Kosovo, and was responsible for soldiers from the U.S., Ukraine, Poland, Lithuania, Armenia and Greece. Gen. Beck's previous assignment was as the deputy commanding general – maneuver of the division, which he served in from February 2004 to October 2006. In that position he oversaw the operations, readiness and training of the three combat maneuver brigades and aviation brigade, as well as serving as second-in-command of the entire division. Prior to Gen. Beck's full-time employment with the National Guard, he was a high school Spanish and German teacher from 1980-1984, and retail manager with the J.C. Penny Company from 1977-1980.

Gen. Beck was born in Canonsburg, Pa. He graduated from Monongahela High School in 1972, and Millersville State College in 1975, with a Bachelor of Science degree in German. He attended West Chester State College where he received a teacher's certification in Spanish. In 1996, he received a master's degree in instructional systems design from Pennsylvania State University. Gen. Beck is a graduate of the Infantry Officer Basic Course, Infantry Officer Advanced Course, Combined Arms Staff School, Command and General Staff College and the U.S. Army War College. He was promoted to his current rank March 1, 2003.

His awards include the Legion of Merit (2nd Award); Meritorious Service Medal (6th Award); Joint Service Commendation Medal; Army Commendation Medal; Army Achievement Medal; Army Reserve Component Achievement Medal (7th Award); National Defense Service Medal (2nd Award); Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal; Kosovo Campaign Medal; Armed Forces Reserve Medal with bronze hourglass, M device and 2nd Award; Army Service Ribbon; Reserve Component Overseas Service Ribbon; NATO Medal (2nd Award); Pennsylvania Commendation Medal; Pennsylvania Service Ribbon with one silver star; Pennsylvania 20-Year Service Medal; Major General Thomas R. White Medal; and the Major General Thomas J. Stewart Medal. Gen. Beck resides in Denver, Pa., and has a son, Sgt. Jerry Beck III, a former U.S. Marine, who is now a soldier in the Pennsylvania Army National Guard.





111th BRAC update

As part of the 2005 BRAC round, Navy and Marine units are slated to leave NASJRB Willow Grove by September 15, 2011. Air National Guard, Army National Guard and Army Reserve units will continue to be stationed there in a military enclave maintained at the base.

Congressional action has clarified the future status of the nearly 1,000 acres of Navy property at Willow Grove that will not be directly owned and operated by the military. Under Section 3703 of HR 2206 (the "U.S. Troop Readiness, Veterans' Care, Katrina Recovery and Iraq Accountability Appropriations Act" of 2007), which was signed into law in May 2007, the Navy is to transfer this property to the Air Force at no cost for designation as a Joint Interagency Installation for use by the Pennsylvania National Guard, other elements of the Armed Forces, other government agencies (federal, state and local), and associated users.


The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, which agreed in principle to accept ownership and control of the Joint Interagency Installation from the Air Force, contracted for a feasibility study and implementation plan report, which was completed in March 2008. DMVA conducted a well-attended and lively public information meeting about the plan in later March. In April 2008, the Commonwealth advised the Air Force and the Navy of the desired footprint for the future Joint Interagency Installation, which essentially included all available federal government property within the fence line at NASJRB Willow Grove.

Congress again acted to set the future course of the new Joint Interagency Installation with enactment of Section 8115 of the Consolidated Security, Disaster Assistance, and Continuing Appropriations Act, which was signed into law by President Bush on September 30, 2008. This law formally establishes the "Horsham Joint Interagency Installation" and provides names for the installation and the airfield ("Pitcairn-Willow Grove Field"). It provides for the mandatory no-cost transfer of the property from the Air Force to the Commonwealth subject to provisions on future use of the installation.


This legislation is important because it makes it clear that establishment of the installation and its transfer to the Commonwealth is mandatory as a matter of federal law. It means that the HJII will be in operation under state jurisdiction and control, and an active airfield will be available for use by the military, government users, and associated users of the installation.

On October 14, 2008, President Bush signed the Duncan Hunter National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2009 into law. Section 2854 of this legislation places limits on the use of the runway at the Horsham JII. It was endorsed by Governor Rendell and it represents a sensible and balanced approach to address local concerns about future airport use. This provision defines "associated users" of the installation and prohibits commercial passenger and cargo operations at the Pitcairn-Willow Grove Field except those supporting the national defense, homeland security and emergency preparedness missions of the Installation. It also provides that Pitcairn-Willow Grove Field will not be used as reliever airport except in emergency circumstances, and it limits use of the airfield to tenants of the Installation.

As 2008 comes to a close, the most pressing challenge facing Horsham Joint Interagency Installation and its adjacent military enclave is the need to firmly establish a future military flying mission for the 111th Fighter Wing of the Pennsylvania Air National Guard. Under BRAC 2005, this unit, and its allotment of personnel (end strength) are to be maintained at Willow Grove for missions assigned by the Department of Defense. Although the BRAC decision approved redistribution of the 111th Fighter Wing's A-10 (Thunderbolt) aircraft – which is scheduled to begin in Spring 2009 – it also encouraged the Air Force to keep an A-10 flying mission for the 111th. The Congressional actions with regard to the Horsham Joint Interagency Installation and Pitcairn-Willow Grove Field have removed a huge hurdle to assignment of a future flying mission to the 111th. These actions, coupled with the commitment of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to the future of the installation, effectively assure that a fully-functional, 8,000 foot runway, with associated infrastructure; will be available in the future. The Installation, with its key strategic location and well-maintained facilities, is ready and able to support future military and government flying missions, and the Commonwealth must focus its efforts to convince the Department of Defense and other federal government agencies to base appropriate flying missions at this location.

Defense Distribution Center (DDC) is the headquarters for 25 defense distribution centers across the Continental United States, Hawaii, Japan, Germany, Guam, Italy, Kuwait and Korea. The DDC and its centers are responsible for receiving, storing, and shipping Department of Defense owned commodities to all branches of the armed forces, as well as, to other agencies of the federal government and some foreign governments.

In addition to its distribution centers, in June 2006, DDC implemented the Deployable Distribution Center, which is a cadre of distribution personnel and equipment ready to deploy worldwide to provide distribution services.

Defense Distribution Center Susquehanna, Pennsylvania (DDSP) is one of two strategic distribution platforms under the Defense Distribution Center. It supports Department of Defense customers in the eastern half of the United States, Central and South America, Europe, North Africa and Southwest Asia. It is responsible for over 700,000 line items.

USA Security Assistance Command (USASAC) is responsible for execution and closure of government-to-government Foreign Military Sales contracts and security assistance projects.

USA Recruiting Battalion, Harrisburg is responsible for overseeing the recruiting efforts of 32 regular Army stations located in 36 of the 67 counties in Pennsylvania.

- **2nd Battalion (Training Support) (Field Artillery), 315th Regiment** is responsible to provide doctrinal training support and evaluations to Army National Guard Field Artillery battalions across the Mid-Atlantic region. It also provides Field Artillery Mobile Training Teams to supported units to ensure reserve component combat readiness. The battalion maintains a trained Defense Coordination Element A Team to provide military support to civilian agencies in the event of a presidential declared disaster.
- 3rd Battalion (Training Support) (Engineer), 315th Regiment is responsible to provide doctrinal support and evaluations to Army National Guard Engineer battalions across the Mid-Atlantic region. It evaluates the operation of all engineers and engineer related weapons systems.
- **4**th **Marine Corp District** is responsible for overseeing the Marine Corps recruiting efforts within Pennsylvania.

Harrisburg Military Entrance Process Station (MEPS) is responsible to process individuals for enlistment or induction into the armed services based on Department of Defense approved peacetime and mobilization standards.

USMC Recruiting Station, **Harrisburg** is responsible for the recruitment of individuals into the Marine Corp. Its area of responsibility consists of the eastern part of the Commonwealth.

Brig. Gen. Peter J. Talleri, U.S. Marine Corps Commander, Defense Distribution Center

United States Marine Corps Brig. Gen. Peter J. Talleri assumed command of the Defense Distribution Center on June 20, 2008.



Colonel Perry L. Knight, United States Army, became the Defense Distribution Center Chief of Staff in July 2006.




His military training includes the Transportation Officer Basic and Advanced Courses, the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, and the U.S. Army War College.





- **Strategic Studies Institute** publishes security and strategic reports and publications which serve to influence policy debate and bridge the gap between military and academia.
- Peacekeeping and Stability Operations Institute serves as the U.S. military's center of
 excellence for mastering stability and peace operations at the strategic and operational
 levels in order to improve military, civilian agency, international, and multinational capabilities
 and execution.
- Army Physical Fitness Research Institute executes research, education and outreach to
 establish, promote and sustain a culture that measurably impacts the overall health of the US
 military and allied senior leadership in support of the national military strategy.

<u>U.S. Army Garrison, Carlisle Barracks</u> provides quality infrastructure and services to support Carlisle Barracks units' mission readiness and execution while enabling the well-being of the regional military community. The Garrison is in the midst of the post's most extensive construction period since the 1950s: military family residences are being completely replaced by modern homes, or renovated in the case of historic buildings. Young Hall residences, the Anne Ely One-Stop In processing Center and Upton Hall have undergone renovation. A new Youth Center is schedule for construction.

<u>Dunham U.S. Army Health Clinic</u> provides full-service outpatient treatment for eligible military beneficiaries, both active duty and retired, throughout Pennsylvania. Dunham Army Health Clinic is a subordinate unit of the North Atlantic Regional Medical command.

<u>U.S. Army Dental Clinic</u> is subordinate to the U.S. Army Dental Activity Walter Reed. Dental care offered for active-duty service members includes a range of diagnostic, consultative and restorative dental services.

<u>Carlisle Barracks Exchange</u> offers retail shopping and vendor services to the military ID cardeligible population: active duty soldiers, Reserve and National Guard soldiers, retired military and their family members.

<u>Defense Commissary Agency</u> operates a retail grocery market for military beneficiaries of the active and reserve components, retirees and their family members.


DR. WILLIAM T. JOHNSEN

JOHN "JACK" CHARLES SKELLY III, COLONEL, Logistics



Continue north on Route 309 to Center Valley. Turn right onto Route 378 north towards Bethlehem. Follow Route 378 over South Mountain. About halfway down the far sides of the mountain, at the second set of yellow blinking lights, turn right onto Summit Street. At the end of Summit Street, the Alumni Memorial Building will be directly in front of you. There is a visitors' parking lot directly in front of the building.

From Route I-78:

Take the Hellertown/Bethlehem exit 67 (formerly 21) to Route 412 North then follow directions for "From the west."

From the East:

Go straight at the end of the exit ramp across Route 412 onto Silvex Road (between Wendy's and Turkey Hill). Then follow directions for "From the west."

From the West:

Turn right at the end of the exit ramp onto Route 412 North (Main Street). Turn left at the traffic light at Silvex Road. Continue on Silvex under the railroad overpass and across the creek. Saucon Park will be on your right. Go straight under I-78 and continue to William Street (you will see a sign for the Asa Packer Campus). At the stop sign go straight across William Street to College Drive. The athletic facilities of Lehigh's Murray Goodman Campus will be on your left. Turn right at the stop sign on Mountain Drive South and continue back under I-78 and through the next stop sign. Follow the Lehigh University directional signs for the Asa Packer Campus. Bear left at the fork at the top of the mountain. The entrance to Lehigh's Mountaintop Campus will be on your right. Continue on Mountain Drive through the first stop sign. Stay right at the fork past Lehigh's Sayre Fields and continue through the stop sign. Take the second left through the stone gates onto Lower Sayre Park Road. Follow Lower Sayre Park Road down the mountain. Turn left at the stop sign facing Taylor College (the tan residence). About 50 feet ahead is the next stop sign. Turn left onto University Drive and bear right where the road circles around Trembley Park Apartments. At the stop sign, turn left. At the next stop sign, turn left onto Memorial Drive West. The Alumni Memorial Building will be on your left, with the parking lot immediately past the building.



CHARLES M. MCCLUNG LIEUTENANT COLONEL

LTC Charles M. McClung became the Director of the Army Officer Education Program at Lehigh University on 30 June 2006. Originally from North Carolina, LTC McClung is a 1988 graduate of Campbell University. His military education includes the Field Artillery Officer Basic and Advanced Courses, Combined Arms Services Staff School, and the Army Command and General Staff College. LOCATION:

The Army ROTC is located on the 2nd floor of Wright Hall, which is located on Dauphin Street in the center of the Shippensburg University Campus.

From Shippensburg:

Coming in from Prince Street or main entrance: You will have a choice of going straight or right. Take a right. You will be taking your first left on to Dauphin by Memorial Auditorium. The road is hard to see, but the auditorium is easy to spot. Once you take the left, you will see an orange/salmon colored shed. By the shed there is a parking lot. Park in the front or the back lot behind the orange/salmon building. The building immediately across the street from the orange shed is Wright Hall. You will see the ROTC banner in the second floor window. Come on up to the second floor.

East of Shippensburg:

Take the Pennsylvania Turnpike to Exit 16/226 (Carlisle). Follow U.S. Route 11 north to I-81. Take I-81 south to exit 29 (King Street). Turn right at the end of the exit ramp onto PA-174. Travel 2 miles to a "T" intersection. Turn left onto King Street (U.S. Route 11). At the 3rd traffic light, turn right onto North Prince Street. Proceed 1/2 mile to main entrance of the Shippensburg University campus.

West of Shippensburg:

Take the Pennsylvania Turnpike to Exit 15/201 (Blue Mountain). Turn left onto PA Route 997. At the "Y" intersections bear right onto route 696. At the town of Newburg, watch the signs carefully and stay on Route 696 (requires a left turn followed by an immediate right turn). Continue on Route 696 south another 8 miles to Shippensburg. Entrance to the campus will be on the left.

Due North or North East of Shippensburg:

Take I-81 South to exit 29 (King Street). Turn right at the end of the exit ramp onto PA 174. Travel 2 miles to a "T" intersection. Turn left onto King Street (U.S. Route 11). At the 3rd traffic light, turn right onto North Prince Street. Proceed 1/2 mile to main entrance of the Shippensburg University campus.

North West of Shippensburg:

Take rural routes to I-81 and follow directions from North or use rural routes to PA turnpike and follow directions from West.

Due South or South West of Shippensburg:

Take I-81 North to Pennsylvania. Continue to exit 24 (Fayette Street). At exit ramp, turn left onto Route 696 and travel 2 miles to a "T" intersection. Turn left onto Fayette Street and proceed to another "T" intersection. Turn right onto King Street. At 3rd traffic light, turn left onto North Prince Street. Proceed 1/2 mile to the main entrance of the Shippensburg University campus.

South East of Shippensburg (Baltimore or DC area):

Take I-70 West to Hagerstown, MD and exit onto I-81 North. Cross into PA and take exit 24 (Fayette Street). At the end of the exit ramp, turn left onto Route 696 and travel 2 miles to a "T" intersection. Turn left onto Fayette Street and proceed to another "T" intersection. Turn right onto King Street. At the third light, turn left onto North Prince Street. Proceed 1/2 mile to the main entrance of the Shippensburg University campus.



Additional sea assignments include an exchange tour as the Squadron Weapons Officer to the Commander, Australian Submarine Squadron in Perth, Western Australia, where he led weapons certification teams on the Royal Australian Navy's diesel submarines. Following command, he served as the Information Warfare Commander and Assistant Chief of Staff for Communications, Command, and Control (N6) on the USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67) battle group staff. During his tour, the battle group conducted combat operations in support of Operation ENDURING FREEDOM in Afghanistan.
