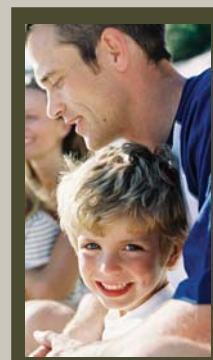


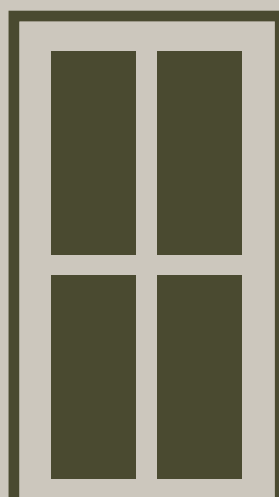

THE BENEFITS WE PROVIDE TO THE COMMUNITIES WE SERVE

This past year, Summit Health's community benefits programs and services focused on the health care, social, and welfare needs of the communities and people who make up greater Franklin County.

Accordingly, this annual report 'highlights' pro-active and measurable improvements in health care access, health status, and the use of health care resources. It is consistent with our overall mission of 'improving the health and well being of the people living in greater Franklin County,' as well as accountability for our tax-exempt status and community benefits program.

As such, this annual report reflects the 'true' costs for services at Chambersburg Hospital, Waynesboro Hospital, Cumberland Valley Medical Services, and Chambersburg Health Services, all affiliates of Summit Health.

For this period, Summit Health's quantifiable community benefit was \$25.6 million. In addition, to carry out our charitable purpose, we reinvested \$17.3 million in new technology, for a combined total of almost **\$43 million**.

COMMUNITY BENEFIT CATEGORIES

CHARITY CARE

For many in our community, these are desperate times. For that reason, this past year alone, Summit Health 'freely' gave **\$17.3 million** in services for those who couldn't afford health care and were not eligible for public programs, or who didn't have adequate insurance coverage...

- The father who worked part-time without adequate insurance to cover his child's ER visit.
- The young mother who missed work to care for her sick child, and then needed medical treatment herself.
- The elderly woman who couldn't afford supplemental insurance to cover her Medicare deductible, and then suffered a stroke.



These were our neighbors, friends, seniors, children, pregnant women, and newborns. The people we care about, and who greatly need our help.

GOVERNMENT-SPONSORED HEALTH CARE

It is the mission of Summit Health to provide health care services to the elderly, disabled, and children within our local community. To meet this goal, the Chambersburg Hospital and Waynesboro Hospital participates in the Medicare program that represents **45 percent** of the hospitals' revenue.

Summit Health's charity program may reduce a patient's bill by 25 to 100 percent. In addition, those not qualifying have the option of paying in installments. Both hospitals also participate in Medicaid, and the state-funded CHIP Program for children.

An independent contractor, HRSI, was paid **\$257,000** by Summit Health to help patients in applying for medical assistance and to explain the charity care program.

COMMUNITY BENEFIT PROGRAMS

To help reduce barriers for the indigent and uninsured, Summit Health, supports Keystone Health Services, a 501(c)(3) organization, that helps those needing behavioral health, maternity, cardiology, dental, pediatric, and primary care services, in the amount of **\$543,000**.

TOUCHING LIVES

This past year, **1,442** babies were born at Chambersburg Hospital and **518** at Waynesboro Hospital.

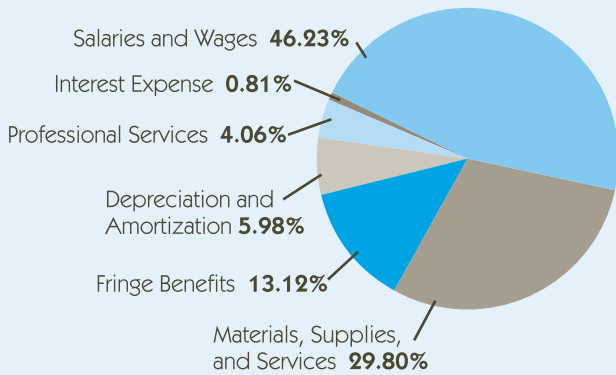

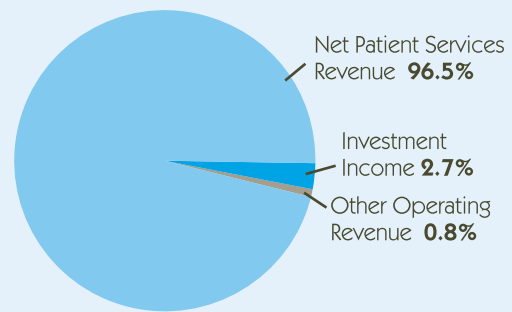

This past year, Summit Health incurred \$626,000 to improve the health and well being of the communities we’re proud to serve.



COMMUNITY HEALTH EDUCATION

Summit Health’s community health and education programs promoted wellness, safety, and heart health. Coordinated with other community partner agencies, our programs included Children’s Wellness Days, employee wellness, pediatric asthma program, safety education, county-wide CPR training, free tobacco cessation classes, smoke free restaurant guides, compliance checks, free bone density screenings, women’s heart health screenings, community health fairs, a Girl Scout badge earning event, and a speakers bureau.

Free Community-Wide Health Fairs

With dozens of community agencies and volunteers, Summit Health’s 4th Annual Heart, Cancer and Diabetes Health Fair and Waynesboro Hospital’s 24th Annual Health Fair, saw a combined number of 4,500 attendees. The health fairs offered free screenings that included lab tests, bone density, body mass index, foot, vision, hearing, and pulmonary function screenings.

Diabetes Education and Management

This subsidized program, coordinated by dedicated diabetes educators and dietitians, is designed for patients with diabetes and their family members.

Rhonda Brake Shreiner Women’s Center

Designed to meet the very special needs of women is the Rhonda Brake Shreiner Women’s Center with mammography, bone density studies, and a convenient resource center with web access.

Community Health Information

Public service announcements included information on health fairs and tobacco cessation.

Summit Health’s web-based consumer health information library is an informational tool about illnesses, diagnosis, and treatment. There are interactive quizzes and health assessments. The site has both English and Spanish translations. To subscribe to our e-health newsletters, visit our web site at www.summithealth.org/newsletters.

Health Images, a quarterly community newsletter, reached 40,000+ homes in greater Franklin County with important information on weight, diabetes, health fairs, and other free events.

For Those With Cancer

Summit Health's cancer services boasts 'gold standard' technology with skilled surgeons and oncologists. The program meets the high standards of the Commission on Cancer of the American College of Surgeons (ACOS) with Commendation. This is further evidence of the quality of care we provide cancer patients.

We held support groups and partnered with the American Cancer Society, the Pennsylvania Department of Health, and the Cumberland Valley Breast Care Alliance in activities such as the Relay for Life; National Cancer Survivors' Day; Daffodil Days; I Can Cope; Look Good, Feel Better classes; and the Pink Ribbon Dinner.

COMMUNITY BASED CLERICAL SERVICES

Free pastoral care services were offered in conjunction with local churches and religious congregations, including seminars and training programs on such topics as the care of the dying.

HEALTH CARE SUPPORT SERVICES

Chambersburg Hospital and Waynesboro Hospital routinely give out information on hotlines, support groups, and community resources that impact outpatient care, regardless of financial status.

We refer to the county transportation system, which is free for eligible low-income individuals and those living in poverty. We cover the costs for taxi tickets for those vulnerable populations.

We contract with the Office of Aging to provide the Lifeline to persons of low income, and provide charity units for those who don't meet the Area Agency on Aging guidelines, but still can't afford the program.

SCHOLARSHIPS/FUNDING FOR PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION

Tuition expense in the amount of **\$625,000** was reimbursed to employees for various courses towards a degree in a health care-related field. The courses may be applicable to associate's, bachelor's, or even graduate degrees. Our tuition loan programs support nursing and allied health career educational programs for both employees and non-employees.

PHYSICIAN/MEDICAL STUDENTS

Continuing medical education hours were offered to the medical staffs at both hospitals. Topics included antibiotic usage, cancer, diabetes, health care quality, cardiovascular disease, new advances in surgery, and hereditary diseases.

NURSES/NURSING STUDENTS

At a cost of **\$304,000**, our new simulation lab ensures the competency of staff caring for patients. Nurses undergo extensive training before licensing and after employment. In addition, clinical staffs can keep abreast of advances and changes in technology.

A new 'Project Learn' partnership with Excelsior College provides an LPN-RN Fast Track program for nurses pursuing an associate's degree in nursing, while on a stipend-supported educational leave of absence. We are now partnering to become Pennsylvania's only Clinical Performance in Nursing Exam Site.

OTHER HEALTH PROFESSIONALS EDUCATION

We work with numerous institutes of higher learning to provide education and recruitment opportunities for staff interested in continuing their education.

Physical Medicine Students

Additionally, physical medicine works with PT, OT, Speech, PTA, and OTA students from numerous universities and colleges.

SUBSIDIZED HEALTH SERVICES

This reporting period, Summit Health incurred more than **\$423,000** in subsidized health services.

EMERGENCY AND TRAUMA SERVICES

Unfortunately, accidents and injuries still happen...When they do, Chambersburg Hospital and Waynesboro Hospital are ready to respond, 24-hours a day, seven days a week. The hospitals screen and stabilize all patients in accordance with the Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act (EMTALA) guidelines. This, while reimbursement from third-party payers does not cover all of the costs of operating a top-rated ER.

Victim Advocate Program

This program includes a dedicated group of highly trained victim advocates, law enforcement, and emergency department staff, who specialize in the care of

victims of rape and sexual assault. In its third year, the Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) has helped numerous victims at Chambersburg Hospital and Waynesboro Hospital. There is no charge for services provided by the SART program.

INPATIENT AND OUTPATIENT BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

We continue to offer inpatient and outpatient behavioral health services to benefit those we serve in greater Franklin County and surrounding areas.

CLINICAL RESEARCH

Clinical research helps us observe our programs and protocols to ensure clinical effectiveness. This period, Summit Health spent **\$213,000** in research that included a C-port study designed to show the clinical effectiveness of percutaneous coronary intervention without open-heart surgery at Chambersburg Hospital.

Chambersburg Hospital's angioplasty and stenting program is currently offered to patients in greater Franklin County. Our cardiology services are...

We received the highest possible star ratings for both coronary interventional procedures and the treatment of heart failure. Interventional cardiologists from the Franklin County Heart Center provide the services at Chambersburg Hospital with a dedicated staff of physicians and specially trained nurses.

Orthopedic surgeons from Cumberland Valley Orthopaedic Associates and Orthopaedic Associates, along with a dedicated staff of therapists and nurses, provide these services at Chambersburg Hospital.

Chambersburg Hospital's pulmonary services are available to patients in greater Franklin County. Our pulmonary services are. . .

- Ranked among the top 10 (#9) in Pennsylvania for overall pulmonary services

- Five-Star Rated for treatment of community acquired pneumonia

Specialists from Pulmonary Associates and the Hospitalists of Franklin County provide these services in conjunction with highly skilled respiratory therapists, nurses, and primary care physicians.

In addition to the above, we are also five-star rated for the treatment of pulmonary embolism, pancreatitis, and for sepsis.

This is according to a leading independent company that provides objective health care ratings, advisory services and decision support tools - HealthGrades.

2007 VHA ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS FOR CARDIOLOGY AND PULMONARY SERVICES

Waynesboro Hospital has received several VHA Apex awards for achieving patient care excellence in heart failure, acute myocardial infarction, and pneumonia core measure indicators. Waynesboro Hospital also received a VHA leadership award for excellence in heart failure and acute myocardial infarction core measure indicators.

In addition to the above, according to the Pennsylvania Health Care Cost Containment Council (PHC4), when comparing the average length of stay among hospitals in Pennsylvania, Chambersburg Hospital scored below or equal to the state hospital average in 24 of 30 conditions, where statistics were available. Waynesboro Hospital patients had shorter stays than the state average in 18 of 22 conditions studied. Still further evidence of the caliber of services we're pleased to provide our patients, each and every day.

FINANCIAL AND IN-KIND CONTRIBUTIONS

This past year, Summit Health provided **\$301,000** in financial aid and in-kind contributions to other non-profit organizations committed to the health and well being of the communities we serve.

The **Summit Endowment – Investing in Tomorrow's Community Health**, is increased annually through contributions representing 10 percent of the Summit Health hospitals' net operating revenue. Accordingly, this reporting period recipients were:

- **Chambersburg Area School District Foundation** for RealCare II baby simulators, car seats, and upgraded software for the family consumer sciences unit on parenting at Faust Junior High School.
- **Greencastle-Antrim Education Foundation** for the Lewis and Clark walking and nutrition program in the elementary school.
- **House of Grace** to offer nutrition classes to women served by House of Grace and to help overcome personal obstacles to good nutrition and healthy eating.

- **Manito, Inc.** to continue the Crossings program to provide home counseling and support services to pregnant teens and teen parents in Franklin County.
- **Penn State Mont Alto Nursing Program** to fund a faculty position in the registered nurse associate degree program.
- **Rhonda Brake Shreiner Women's Center** to offer *Your Breast Cancer Treatment Handbook* to women diagnosed with breast cancer and an educational handout to women having procedures at the Center.
- **Summit Health Women's Heart Program** to expand the Women's Heart Advantage education program, launched in early 2004, by offering risk factor screenings in collaboration with Franklin County Heart Center.
- **Summit Health Quality Management** to provide all discharged patients over the age of 50 at Waynesboro Hospital and Chambersburg Hospital with a wallet-size personal health record of medications.
- **Waynesboro Area Advanced Life Support (Medic 2)** to spearhead a year-long paramedic program through the newly re-organized Pennsylvania Institute of Applied Health Sciences.

Thus far, almost \$2 million has been disbursed to establish programs designed to improve the health of area residents.

Free Influenza Vaccines

To prevent the spread of infectious diseases, Chambersburg Hospital and Waynesboro Hospital educated staff on good handwashing techniques, used universal precautions, and administered doses of influenza vaccine to the medical staff, volunteers, employees and community.

VOLUNTEERISM

This past year, more than **450** volunteers donated a total of **57,200** hours. This while, **300** auxiliaries supported the activities of the Chambersburg Hospital. The auxiliary's generous gift of **\$60,000** towards a **\$1 million** pledge will benefit patients having cardiology services.

At Waynesboro Hospital, almost **200** volunteers donated **21,062** hours. This while, **425** auxiliaries supported Waynesboro Hospital with gifts of more than **\$28,000** to benefit the community. Waynesboro

Hospital Auxiliary also helped to promote health care in our community by donating **\$13,668** for genetic screening for infants; and six scholarships, including the Pearl Warren scholarship.

The fact that so many area residents willingly provide support at Chambersburg Hospital and Waynesboro Hospital without compensation, tangibly demonstrates their commitment to our public charitable mission.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

This reporting period, almost **\$300,000** was spent on programs and services that, while not directly related to health care, provide opportunities to address the root causes of health problems, such as poverty, homelessness, and environmental problems.

Reducing Risks

The Franklin/Fulton County Child Death Review Team addresses issues that may prevent additional deaths. The Pennsylvania Academy of Pediatrics, the Pennsylvania State Department of Health, Children and Youth, the Department of Human Services, Healthy Communities Partnership, and representatives from the Chambersburg Hospital and Waynesboro Hospital meet regularly to review statistics with the goal of providing preventive education.



Disaster Preparedness is a Top Priority

This past year, Chambersburg Hospital and Waynesboro Hospital participated in a Department of Health-sponsored epidemic tabletop exercise, a community-wide radiological exercise, and a community-wide response to a terrorist attack. We also participated in various community readiness agency activities,

such as the Penn State nursing program’s annual disaster training.

COALITION BUILDING

This past year, Summit Health supported coalitions assisting in improving the community’s health.

Healthy Communities Partnership

Healthy Communities Partnership (HCP) provides learning opportunities on issues impacting the health habits of the community. This past year, 78 partners collaborated to pursue the vision of a healthy Franklin County. Summit Health contributed monies to support the operating expenses of HCP.

Sharing Our Expertise

Summit Health’s senior management team are active representatives in community coalitions and partnerships. These include the Kiwanis Club, the United Way of Franklin County, Healthy Communities Partnership, the Local Emergency Planning Committee, Keystone Health Services, the Franklin County Healthcare Consortium, the South-Central Workforce Investment Board, Chambersburg 21st Century Partnership, the Franklin County Area Development Corporation (FCADC), the Chambers of Commerce, and the Chambersburg Hispanic Center.

Summit Health’s physical medicine staffs share their expertise on local, state, and national boards, such as Penn State Mont Alto PTA Advisory Committee, and the State Board of Occupational Therapy Education and Licensure.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Summit Health participates in community workforce boards and partnerships to address community-wide issues. We also partner with community colleges and universities to address the health care workforce shortages in greater Franklin County.

Ensuring Skilled Providers

Our commitment to attract physicians in varying specialties requires not only adequate resources, but also a strong financial institution that delivers quality health care. Today, Summit Health employs about 60 physicians.

In addition to the above, greater Franklin County qualifies as a Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA). Accordingly, last year alone, Summit Health spent almost **\$750,000** on recruitment costs, and more than **\$4 million** to maintain physician practices that would otherwise be lost from Pennsylvania. We suc-

cessfully recruited providers in anesthesiology, cardiology, emergency medicine, dermatology, family medicine, gastroenterology, general surgery, orthopedics, hospitalists, internal medicine, nephrology, OB/Gyn, ophthalmology, oncology, otolaryngology, pathology, pediatrics, psychiatry, and radiology.

School Related Programs

Summit Health's school liaison program mentored Greencastle-Antrim Elementary third grade students to teach lessons in Junior Achievement. They also: provided a 'career' puppet show to third grade students during Children's Wellness Days; held two different Healthcare Careers Institutes for area high schools with student participants; and provided presentations, expos, and fairs to students and families about opportunities in health care careers. Our shadowing program reached more than 500 students.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

A recent report by the Hospital and HealthSystem Association of Pennsylvania (HAP) revealed Summit Health's total spending benefit to the region's economy is almost **\$548 million**. This is further evidence of our value to the communities we are pleased and proud to serve.

COMMUNITY BENEFIT OPERATIONS

This reporting period, Summit Health incurred almost **\$150,000** in dedicated staffs to help ensure a successful community benefits program within greater Franklin County.

OTHER: STEWARDSHIP STRENGTHS

The primary health care provider in greater Franklin County and the largest non-governmental employer, Summit Health understands its role in meeting the special needs of the communities we serve.

Reinvesting in New Technology

In addition to the above, giving back to the community with new technology is a critical element of the services we provide. Earnings are applied to improvements in patient care, medical training, education, expansion and repair of facilities, and amortization of debt.

During this period, Chambersburg Hospital and Waynesboro Hospital incurred more than **\$2 million** in expenses for information technology, as it relates to picture archival communications systems (PACS), to provide filmless imaging and enhanced diagnostic imaging services; and **\$1.4 million** for technology to implement new medication patient safety tools and processes involved in bar coding our medication. An additional **\$13.9 million** was spent on equipment for patient services, cancer, cardiac catheterization, surgical services, the perinatal unit, pediatrics, the ER, lab, x-ray, etc. Total capital expenditures were **\$17.3 million**. This directly benefits the services we provide our community.



Positive Income Margins

A study released by the Pennsylvania Health Care Cost Containment Council showed Chambersburg Hospital and Waynesboro Hospital posting positive income margins from 2004 to 2006, while nearly one-third of hospitals statewide were operating in the red.

The Role of Our Trustees

Without exception, Chambersburg Hospital and Waynesboro Hospital, both 501(c)(3) affiliates of Summit Health, accept their social and corporate responsibilities as the region's primary health care provider and largest non-governmental employer. In so doing, we operate free from private profit as part of our mission and charitable purpose. Board members with roots in the community govern the organization and serve without compensation. Without our tax-exempt status, we could not attract such qualified and dedicated volunteer trustees.

This report will be shared at the annual meeting of the board to include media representatives and will be displayed on the Summit Health web site.
